Architecture That Tells a Story Kenosha Public Museums | Kenosha, Wisconsin

The Kenosha Public Museums are uniquely defined by three architecturally different buildings, each designed to embody the history interpreted within its walls.

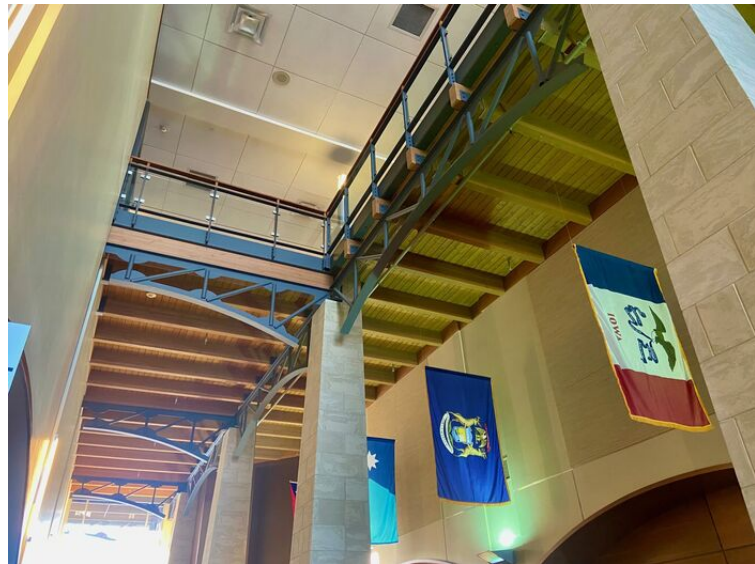
The Kenosha Public Museum, designed by Engberg Anderson Design Partners, pulled inspiration for its design from the Wisconsin Ice Age. Its glass and copper wedge, accented with blue-tinted windows, hint to the immense glaciers that once shaped the region. Anchoring the building is a monumental 118-foot-long wall constructed of authentic Wisconsin glacial till, weighing more than 100 tons and built with full stones.

The Civil War Museum, next door to the Kenosha Public Museum, also designed by Engberg Anderson Design Partners, draws inspiration from 19th-century military and industrial architecture. Its fortress-like masonry walls and octagonal fort echo historic Civil War sites in Charleston, Savannah, and Mobile. Inside, tapered columns and iron arches echo Civil War-era construction techniques and railroad trestles, symbolizing the transportation networks and industrial strength that shaped the conflict's outcome.



Ten blocks west, the building that now houses the Dinosaur Discovery Museum has been serving the Kenosha community for well over a century. The original home of the Kenosha Public Museum in 1936, the building once served as one of Kenosha's post offices. Built in 1909 by architect James Knox Taylor in the Beaux Arts style, it took on a new life when the federal government sold it to the City of Kenosha for one dollar in 1928. Rather than letting the building fade into history, the city chose preservation. In the 1930s, it was physically moved to its current location, allowing it to continue serving the public in a new way. Today, it houses a hands-on paleontology lab—an example of how historic spaces can evolve while still honoring their past.

Together, these three buildings show how architecture can interpret history as powerfully as objects and exhibitions.

RLC offers docent-led tours, rotating exhibitions, monthly bird walks, community garden and house tours, and educational programming. The museum has everything from first edition books, to the silent film era movies; the 1939 MGM classic munchkin actor's appearance costumes to props and costumes from The Wiz, Oz The Great and Powerful, The Muppets' Wizard of Oz, OzLand, After The Wizard, Wicked and more. The museum's foundation holds over 18,000 pieces in the collection with 1,500-1,600 on exhibit at any time. Follow the village of Chittenango's Yellow Brick Road sidewalks to the All Things Oz museum to see the world's premiere OZ themes museum. The museum offers guided tours as well as self guided tours in English or American Sign Language via QR code. The museum is run by the International L. Frank Baum & All Things Oz Historical Foundation, a 501(c)3 non-profit organization and a NY State chartered historical foundation.

Built in 1855 as City Hall, Hudson Hall is New York State's oldest surviving theater—a storied landmark whose magnificent auditorium once hosted Ralph Waldo Emerson, Susan B. Anthony, Theodore Roosevelt, and Frederic Edwin Church. After decades of abandonment, the building was rescued and restored by local citizens, reopening its 385-seat theater in 2017. Today, Hudson Hall is a cultural destination offering a year round program of performance, film, visual art, and community programming. The Hudson Jazz Festival draws legendary and emerging performers to a citywide celebration; its Handel on the Hudson series has earned multiple NYTimes Critics' Picks for its baroque opera productions.

Hudson Hall's galleries present exhibitions by international, regional, and local contemporary artists. Past exhibitions include Wolfgang Tillmans, Christian Marclay, Michael Lindsay Hogg, Sita Gómez, and Corinne May Botz.

Chapel of Sacred Mirrors (CoSM) is a cultural institution and nonprofit sanctuary of Visionary Art set on 40 acres in the Hudson Valley of New York, founded by internationally recognized artists Alex Grey & Allyson Grey. CoSM is home to Entheon, a stunning 12,000 sq ft, three-story museum featuring the permanent collection of the Greys' art, alongside rotating exhibitions of visionary artists from around the world. On the third floor, the Sacred Mirrors series of paintings is displayed beneath a cathedral-esque latticework ceiling and surrounded by a quartz crystal moat. Beyond the museum, CoSM offers workshops, a bed & breakfast, wooded hiking trails, a small labyrinth, outdoor art installations, the Mushroom Café, and regular community events including Full Moon Gatherings and Art Church.

One familiar with Portsmouth, Rhode Island may know that the town was founded on the Compact of 1638, the first document of its kind establishing a form of government separating church and state. The Battle of Rhode Island took place here on August 29, 1778.

Visitors will find exhibits throughout the main floor of the museum housed within the former Christian Union Church. Visitors will learn more about the formation of the town by outcasts from Massachusetts Bay Colony. Stone tools and other artifacts offer a glimpse of Aquidneck Island before European settlement.

Since its formation, and well into the 20th century, farming was the primary occupation for the residents of the town. An assortment of agricultural artifacts and housewares showcase the more utilitarian but all important aspect of life here in Portsmouth.

One of approximately 300 single-artist museums worldwide, Museo Benini was established in 2015 to share the evolution of Benini's work since the late 1950s. Museo Benini (Italian for museum, pronounced muse-a-oh) - 6500 sq.ft. galleries showcase Superroses of the 70's, the surrealistic works of the 80's, the geometrics of the 90's, and recent works of a more abstract nature. The project also includes a fine arts research library, archives and 60+ outdoor sculptures.

Guests are welcome to tour the sculpture trail featuring the museum collection of sculpture by international artists. Italian-born Benini's paintings and sculpture have been exhibited in 163 mostly solo international exhibitions, finding their permanent home on a 35 acre ranch in the Texas Hill Country.

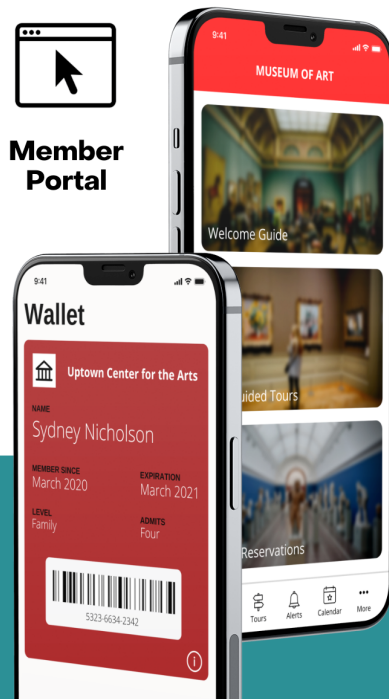


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(Un)Settled: The Landscape in American Art Presented by the Columbia Museum of Art
